Wednesday Evening Series Continues with Diverse Speakers

IN A WORLD OF RELIGIOUS and ideological division, Christ Church Cranbrook is offering a unique and unifying faith formation series. The Wednesday Evening Programs series of discussions features the perspectives of prominent Christian, Muslim, and Jewish clergy and theologians. The objective is to understand the common thread of humanity's religious quest leading to greater clarity of the specific and unique characteristics of the three major religions in the world.

The October Series, *Sacred Scriptures: Read Literally or Contextually*, will sharpen the focus of each religion in reading of sacred texts. Speakers include **Rabbi Jeffrey Ableser**, University of Windsor, Canada, on October 7; Wayne State Instructor, **Dr. Saeed Kahn**, Director, Institute for Social Policy and Understanding on October 14; and **Dr. Charles Mabee**, Professor, New Testament, Ecumenical Theological Seminary, Detroit, on October 21. The October 28 session will offer the opportunity to review Bible translations and reading guides with the Christ Church Cranbrook Clergy staff.

The series in November will focus on the world-wide state of God's people while Critical Issues of Faith such as fundamentalism, Genetic Engineering, and Racism, will be discussed in December.

All sessions will meet at 7:00 PM in Rooms 201 and 202 at Christ Church Cranbrook, 470 Church Road, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan. For more information, please call 248-644-5210 Ext. 28.

Alzheimer Book Written By Former Rector Donated to CCC

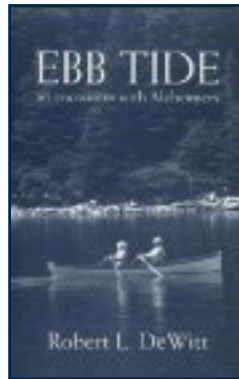
ALZHEIMER DISEASE affects approximately 5 million people in the US. Over time it gradually destroys a person's memory and ability to learn and carry out daily activities such as talking, eating, and going to the bathroom. As the disease progresses, individuals may also experience changes in personality and behavior. Unfortunately, there is no cure for Alzheimer Disease and there is no way to predict how quickly someone will progress through the stages of the disease.

This disease is a form of dementia, a term used to describe a group of brain disorders that progressively cause memory loss and a decline in mental function. Current research from the National Institute of Aging indicates that the prevalence for Alzheimer doubles every five years beyond

age 65.

Bishop Robert DeWitt, former Rector of Christ Church Cranbrook wrote, *Ebb Tide:*

An Encounter with Alzheimer Disease. While caring for his own wife with Alzheimer disease, Bishop DeWitt kept a journal from which the book was written. No two caregivers' experiences and approaches to a loved-one with this disease are the same, however; sharing insights, feelings, and ideas is always beneficial. Bishop DeWitt's book fulfills that need.

A Docent's Childhood Memories

Flu Clinic

Be prepared
Sunday, Oct. 11
8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.

In conjunction with the Visiting Nurses Association of Southeast Michigan, CCC will be facilitating an invaluable immunization service. The cost for the various vaccines will be: \$25/flu vaccine; \$30/flu mist (nasal spray); and \$50/pneumonia vaccine. The cost is covered under Medicare Part B for those who qualify (remember to bring your card). The vaccines are available to everyone six months and older, however, those aged six months through age 17 will require signed parental consent.

DURING MY CHILDHOOD at Christ Church Cranbrook, **George and Ellen Booth** were still alive. When the church was built, they had planned that their remains would rest in a crypt in Resurrection Chapel along with those of **Gertrude and Samuel Marquis** (he being the first rector of the church). Although I have no memory of seeing Mr. and Mrs. Booth, I was aware of the crypt and none to sure it wasn't already occupied.

My first volunteer position at CCC was as a member of the Red Choir. The smallest girls sang in the Red Choir. My older sister sang in the Blue Choir, which she assured me was a much more prestigious role. We rehearsed in the choir room upstairs and the carving on the locker room doors around the room fascinated me. Our mother dropped us off on Wednesday afternoon, and we were expected to wait dutifully for the choirmaster to come and rehearse us.

Believe it or not, our choirmaster's name was **Bunker Hill**. He was a happy sort of fellow, younger than my parents, but still "old" in my eyes. Usually he flew into the room, late, his surplice flapping behind him and his music clutched in his hand. Did he indeed always appear in church vestments? Well, that is how I remember him, and I also remember the long red gown, which I wore in Sunday processions.

It had a starched white collar and a big white bow in front.

Because Mr. Hill was always tardy, we children began to find ways to amuse ourselves. Although I was not a mischievous child, I was easily led. Our favorite activity was running downstairs to St. Dunstan's and Resurrection Chapel. Of course, they were unlit, which gave them an air of mystery or even spookiness. In the rear of Resurrection Chapel was a curtain of some rich fabric hanging from wooden rings on a wooden pole. Behind that curtain were The Tombs. The most daring among us would slip behind the curtain and hammer with her fist. The Tombs were enclosed in metal such as file cabinets are made of and they made a most satisfactory sound when hammered. Either the eerie metallic booming or the suspicion that there were dead bodies in there sent us running back out into the hall screaming. I never remember being scolded for this caper. It seems strange to me that we were not more closely supervised.

When the Booth family and the Marquises chose burial in Greenwood Cemetery, the crypt was removed from the chapel. The marble floor was extended back to the rear wall where a set of beautifully carved wood doors was added.

JOHN REPULSKI, DIRECTOR OF MUSIC at CCC, has accepted an invitation by Bonnie Anderson, President of the House of Deputies, to serve a six year appointment on the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music (SCLM) of the Episcopal Church USA.

In addition to considering policies and strategies concerning the common worship of the church, the SCLM, at the direction of the General Convention; collects, collates, and develops textual and musical resources for the liturgical life of the Church.

This is a huge honor and a great privileged to serve the national church on this highly respected and important committee. Typically, the SCLM meets three to four times a year for a few days. John's first meeting will be in Chicago November 17-20, 2009.

Meaningful Gifts for a Meaning-filled Holiday Season

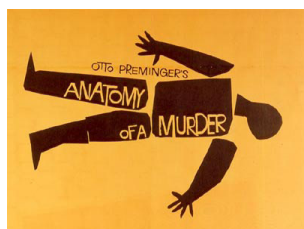
